COLLEGE OVERVIEW



LAKSHMIBAI COLLEGE is one of the premier institutions of higher education for women, founded in 1965 as Women's College, later renamed after an inspirational, exemplary and spirited queen of Jhansi, Rani Lakshmibai. It is a constituent college of University of Delhi. The college has its own well-equipped building, sprawling lawns, sports ground and staff quarters. It has a locational advantage as it is in the close proximity of University of Delhi.

The college is on a run to enhance its infrastructural capacity for the students, faculty and non-teaching staff. The newly built infrastructure of the College includes a new Academic Block-Vikramshila that has the latest infrastructure including Classrooms, Labs and also elevators. On 06th March 2024 Vikramshila was inaugurated by Hon'ble Lok Sabha Speaker, Om Birla Ji. College also has eight classrooms (porta cabins), a well-furnished computerized library, a creche (Parvarish), an open gym, and a health and wellness centre (Arogyam) with a meditation hall, a fully furnished waiting shed, an administrative block (SPS) (Kautilya Block). The two-storey structure behind library -Vishwakarma Block includes a large Gargi Hall, Labs and classrooms. There is also a common room for students and an open stage with pavement for cultural programmes. The college entry gate has a solar panel of 76.8 W.

Our college has taken a great leap forward with respect to technological advancement in higher education, with the introduction of advanced student's identity cards powered by Mastercard wherein all the details of students are embedded in QR code. The card accepts online payments, ATM withdrawals, split transactions, multiple load money options, unlimited add Ons and request money accepted at more than 4mn outlets. We are the first college in Delhi University to go cashless prior to demonetization. Our college has digital display boards, interactive smart boards and digital information kiosk.



At Lakshmibai College, we have highly competent and committed faculty, efficient and skilled non-teaching staff. Our faculty is actively engaged in research, development of new curriculums, undertaking innovative projects, conducting workshops, seminars, symposiums and conferences at national and international levels. A good number of our teachers have authored academic books and research articles in reputed journals. Our college also excels in sports and activities of NCC and NSS.

The college gives prime importance to its sports infrastructure, and has recently developed the Jhalkaribai Shooting Range for the students.

Eco park was developed with the concept of amusement, resource utilization out of waste, recreation of land usage and model ecosystem development for educational purposes. The theme was natural ecosystems. Three different ecosystems - grassland ecosystem, desert ecosystem and aquatic ecosystem are showcased there. To enhance the aquatic biodiversity, a pond ecosystem is also being developed in the college campus with the continuous efforts of former Principal, Prof. (Dr) Pratyush Vatsala at Gokul situated on the college campus.



Our students are deeply conscious of the leadership potential of women and they are constantly inspired to build a community devoid of discrimination and oppression. Student's creativity is evident in a wide ranging co-curricular and extra-curricular activities organized by the various societies, and associations working under the guidance of the staff advisors.

Lakshmibai College is committed to academic excellence and the values of humanism. In the past five decades, the college has carved a niche for itself in the field of education in liberal arts and social sciences for women. The college is an extended college with about 3800 students on rolls. The college utilizes its resources to the optimum. On Sundays and other holidays, it doubles up as a teaching centre for the Non-Collegiate Women's Education Board and also a centre for IGNOU.

FACILITIES

LIBRARY

The College has a well-stocked, computerized library with internet facility, wi-fi connectivity and a spacious reading room which remains open to students throughout the year from 9.00 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. except Saturdays, Sundays and on gazetted holidays.

The college library committee has been actively involved in improving the library and building its book collection. Access to the library is now available to students and teachers through their smart I-cards. The library committee organizes the annual Book Fair.

Books in the General and Textbook sections are issued for one week only. Whereas, books in the Reserve Section—are issued with advance reservation and with the prior permission of the Librarian. Reference books and periodicals are available for consultation only. The College library has been fully automated and uses Libsys Software. Approximately 87,134 books have been put into the Automation process. The library subscribes to around 45 newspapers and magazines and has a rich collection of various reference sources such as encyclopaedias, dictionaries, Atlases and Yearbooks. The library also provides access to about 500 e-journals, and around 75000 e-books through a host of high-quality electronic databases subscribed by Delhi University System (DULS) to its users. The library has an air-conditioned reading hall and it also has computers for the users. For visually impaired students, Braille books & other facilities are also available in the library. Library Tickets and Library-I Cards have been computer generated for staff and students. OPAC (On-Line Public Access Catalogue) facility has also been provided for users. The library also has a Scanner Gun for greater efficiency on the Issue/Return counter. The library is also in process to provide the E-resources through the NList programme of INFLIBNET.



Rules

- ❖ College Identity cards are to be produced every day at all service points, i.e. the entrance, the issue counter, the reference section etc.
- ❖ Students will be fined for damage to library books and may even be deprived of library facilities.
- ❖ Loss of books must be immediately reported to the Librarian in writing, failing which the student will be liable to pay a heavy fine including one and a half times the cost of the book. Tearing pages from any library book/magazine will be fined heavily.
- ❖ Students are required to look up the library notice-board from time to time for library rules and regulations and any other information related to the library.

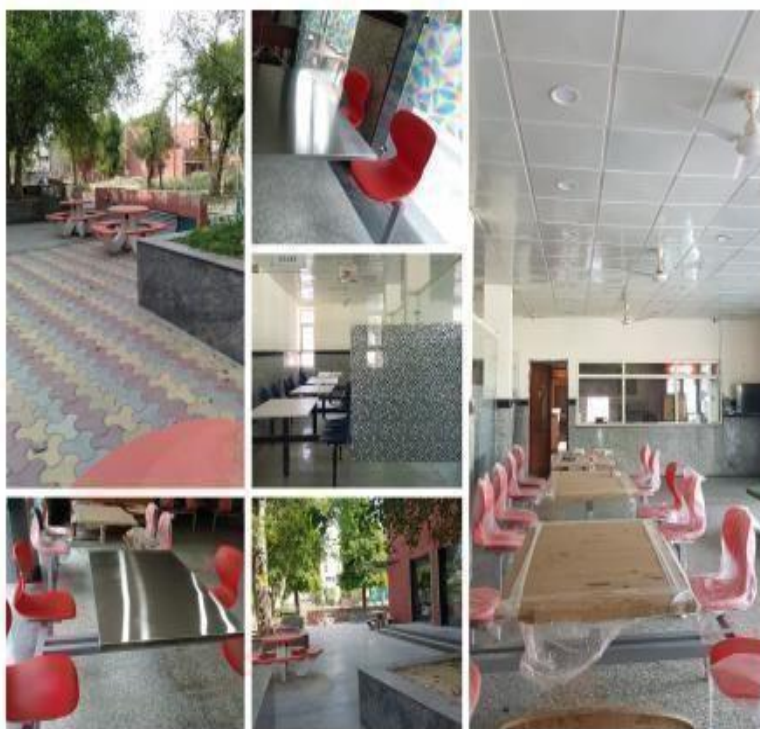
Seminar Room

Canteen

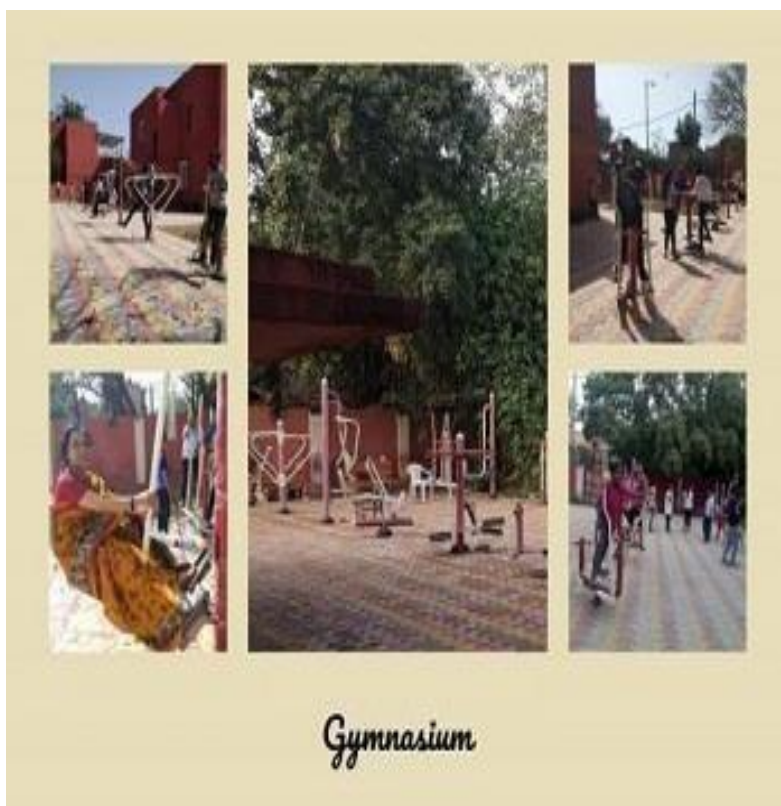
Lakshmibai College is equipped with a fully functional, exclusively vegetarian canteen to serve wholesome, nutritious food to the students and staff. The spacious and well-furnished canteen with intercom facility is situated within the campus next to the car park and just at the back of the Lecture Theatre II. It remains open from 9 A.M. till 5 P.M. on all working days and is under the regular supervision of a catering committee consisting of faculty appointed by the college staff council. It provides catering for in-house functions, visitors as well as assisting with provisions for special events. In case of any problems or suggestions the canteen committee can be contacted.



Gymnasium

The Lakshmibai College is proud to present its modern, up-to-date and fully-equipped gymnasium, an essential feature of the college's robust infrastructure. A sound mind in a sound body is the motto behind the establishment of the college gymnasium. The gymnasium is open to all, including the students and staff. However, it is maintained especially for the students belonging to the sports curriculum. It is a bustling space with a lot of activities and positive vibes playing around. It boasts of almost every required facility, from treadmill to cross-trainer, from cycling machines to twisters to name a few. Further we possess eight station exercise sets, exercise bikes, weighing equipment, crunch exercise equipment.



Principal Internship Scheme:

Principal Internship Scheme is being introduced in Lakshmibai College from the academic session 2024-2025. All Bonafide full time regular students of Lakshmibai College studying in any course/stream at the undergraduate level are eligible to apply for the Summer Internship as well as Regular Internship programmes.

College Laboratories Do's and Don'ts

Do's

1. Know the location of the fire extinguisher and the first aid box and how to use them in case of an emergency.
2. Read and understand how to carry out an activity thoroughly before coming to the laboratory.
3. Report fire or accidents to your Teaching Faculty/laboratory technician immediately.
4. Report any broken plugs or exposed electrical wires to your Teaching Faculty/laboratory technician immediately.

Don'ts

1. Don't eat or drink in the laboratory.
2. Avoid stepping on electrical wires or any other computer cables.
3. Don't open the system unit casing or monitor casing particularly when the power is turned on.
4. Don't insert metal objects such as clips, pins and needles into the computer casings. They may cause fire.
5. Don't remove anything from the computer laboratory without permission.
6. Don't touch, connect or disconnect any plug or cable without your Teaching Faculty/laboratory technician's permission.
7. Don't misbehave in the computer laboratory.

LED Screen: In a significant enhancement of our campus infrastructure, the college successfully held the inauguration ceremony for a new LED screen, graciously funded through the MPLADS (Members of Parliament Local Area Development Scheme) grant of Padma Vibhushan Dr. Sonal Mansingh.

Bank: Bank of India has an Extension Counter in College. It offers all banking facilities to the staff and the students. The Bank has become an integral part of college life by sponsoring seminars and various college activities regularly.

Photostat: The College has a Photostat cabin to provide Photocopy and Print-outs facility on payment basis .

Transport: The Routes connecting to Lakshmibai College by the Bus No. are - 166, 181A, 912 and nearest Metro Station Keshav Puram, Kanhaiya Nagar, Inderlok, Shastri Nagar etc.

Crèche: Young parents on the Lakshmibai campus now have a new support platform for raising and grooming their kids. The College inaugurated its Creche Cum Day Care centre Parvarish on 25th October 2019. The crèche was inaugurated by Shri Gopal Rai, Minister for Employment, Development, Labor, General Administration and Irrigation in Government of Delhi. The Centre is operational from 8.30 am to 5.30 pm. The Centre operates with two floors i.e. Ground and first with fully equipped pantry and child friendly facilities. The centre head and supporting staff undergoes regular training programs for early childhood care. The day to day running of the Centre has been outsourced to an external agency Euro kid, a pre-school and play group chain. Besides being equipped with all the fundamental facilities, the Centre is armed with all the modern technologies. An app-based service through CCTV can enable parents to remotely watch what their kids are doing at the Centre. The Parents Connect group gives a constant update on the activities of the child to the parents.

Health & Wellness Centre: AROGYAM

The place for knowing yourself at all levels through Philosophical and Psychological Counselling, Medical Advice, First Aid etc.

Meditation Centre: The first floor is designed to be a place to know thyself in the purest form of being, to pause and to realize how all the five elements of our body communicate with Nature and the Spirit.

Students can book an appointment for understanding and practice of Mindfulness, Yog asana, Pranayama, Philosophical or Psychological Issues, Counselling, Nutrition or Gynaecologist etc, by sending a mail.



There is a trained and qualified Nurse to look after the first-aid needs of students. Students can take medical help in the Medical Room whenever necessary. Students can avail medical consultation and treatment at W.U.S. Health Centre located at Chhatra Marg, University of Delhi. For this student has to fill up WUS membership form and submit it to dealing (**Membership is optional**). In case of any problems/suggestions the medical committee teachers can be contacted.

Yagya Mandap

To tap into spiritual dimensions and to channelise the energies of human mind in a positive direction, Lakshmibai College has built a Yagya Mandap in the Gokul, situated on campus - a place for performing '*Havan*' rituals.



Facilities for Students with Special Needs

The College provides a sensitive and friendly atmosphere to visually challenged students. It has a fairly large number of such students in all the programs. The College set up a Disability Unit in 2006-07 with the help of a UGC grant in the X plan period under the HEPSN Programme. This unit caters to the needs of students with visual disability. The College is also committed to make them computer literate and to improve their English language skills so that they too construct a universe for themselves.

Counselling and guidance are provided to the differently abled students seeking admissions in our college. The students are helped and guided to apply for scholarship/fellowship and other activities of organized and unorganized sector. Students with visual disabilities are provided laptops with software such as JAWS, NVDA and SAFA' to help them in their studies and other works. A special computer lab known as 'Enabling unit computer lab' was reopened on 3rd October 2016 for them. A computer instructor for skill development is also appointed for visually challenged students.

Creative Board

As a unique space-the Creative Board, provides opportunity to explore the creative potential. The students are invited to share their creative ventures on the CREATIVE BOARD. Student's entries could be in the form of poems, stories (not more than five hundred words), sketches, paintings, etc. Students may mail them to: lbccreativeb@gmail.com

The college publishes Annual Magazine "*JYOTI*", that includes contributions from students and teaching faculty. It has four sections in –English, Hindi, Sanskrit and Punjabi.

Parent Teacher Meeting (PTM): The college also organizes parents/Guardians Meeting every year to connect the parents with teaching faculty members.

The college has lush green front lawns and sprawling sports ground. The students are advised to take care of the cleanliness of the lawns and the sports ground.

ANTI-RAGGING ORDINANCE

In pursuance of *Ordinance XV-C: Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging*,

2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline.
3. The Principal of a college, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of the College, or the University Hostel or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
4. Abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice, or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
5. Students against whom necessary action is taken will be given a post-decisional hearing, with strict adherence to the rules of natural justice.

POST-ADMISSION AND ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

Important Information:

Once a candidate is selected and takes admission after payment of fees and completing other procedures, she becomes a student of the college subject to the approval of her enrolment by the University;

- ❖ For inter-college migration, college follows the Ordinance IV of University of Delhi.
- ❖ Any student, submitting false/forged/fake certificates, will be debarred from admission to any program, and would be liable to legal action as per the norms of the University of Delhi. Admission can also be cancelled. Such cases will be notified to all colleges and to the police.
- ❖ **Orientation Day** will be organised in the college for the New Entrants.
- ❖ Students will also be informed about the **Student Induction Programme**.
- ❖ Students are advised to check the college website on a regular basis.

Academic Requirements and Attendance Advisory:

The students of the college are governed by the rules and regulations of the University of Delhi as

laid down in the Ordinance VII of the University. All the students are required to attend all the lectures, tutorials and practical's regularly. Students not fulfilling the attendance requirement, as prescribed by the University, may be debarred from appearing in the University examinations.

Therefore, students are required to maintain attendance as per University Rules. In case of illness, the leave application must be accompanied by a medical certificate and fitness certificate which should be submitted to the college office. Please note that shortage of attendance will not be condoned for attending other programs of study outside the college

NOTE: All the new students are advised to carry their admissions slip with them.

Identity Card: Every student is given an Identity Card, which she must bring to the College every day. This card must be produced as and when required. Disciplinary action may be taken on failure to do so. If the Identity card is lost, a duplicate must be obtained on payment.

ACADEMIC/CO-CURRICULAR SOCIETIES

INTERNSHIPS , APPRENTICESHIP, PROJECTS AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH COMMITTEE (IAPC) REPORT 2025-26

Since its inception, the IAPC has consistently worked toward providing high-quality internship programs, and the 2025–2026 academic year proved to be no exception. Under the expert guidance of Convener Dr. Gitanjali Dey and core committee members Dr. Ojaswini Hooda and Ms. Pracheta Bakshi, the committee facilitated a wide range of professional endeavors. The session launched with a well-attended Orientation cum MoU-signing ceremony on August 6, 2025, where esteemed dignitaries including Dr. Purna Malhotra, Dr. Avitoli, Mrs. Tripti Somani, and Mr. Manoranjan inducted students through interactive sessions. To ensure specialized oversight, faculty coordinators were assigned to various centers, including Gyan Publications (Dr. Gitanjali Dey), Womenovator (Dr. Ojaswini Hooda & Ms. Pracheta Bakshi), Sewa Bharti (Ms. Sheetal), the Centre for Hindu Studies & Centre for Democracy, Pluralism and Human Rights (Mr. Abhishek Bhaskar), and the Centre for Tribal Studies (Dr. Sumit Kumar Meena). Following a rigorous digital enrollment process, students committed to a demanding 60-hour training schedule tailored to their chosen fields. A standout initiative of the year was the “Speed Mentorship” event held on October 11, 2025, where industry experts provided rapid 15-minute guidance sessions, allowing interns to gain diverse career insights and constructive feedback in a high-energy environment. The semester concluded successfully with Viva-Voce and Practical examinations held on December 8, 2025. Having already completed the selection process for the even semester (January–April 2026), the IAPC remains dedicated to providing hands-on experience and preparing students for the professional world.

Bachelor of Business Economics

The Department of Business Economics organised a plethora of activities through Impetus– The Business Economics Society. The academic session commenced with an Orientation Programme on 4th August 2025 and an insightful seminar on E-Commerce led by Mr. Kshitij Sharma (eBay) on 6th August 2025. Technical skill-building was prioritized through a Python and Data Analysis workshop conducted by Mr. Ankit Kumar on September 24, 2025.

The society's active contribution to college life continued with the Diwali Mela on October 15, 2025, where Impetus hosted "Daastan 2.0," a popular stall offering creative services and themed polaroids. The society held its Office Bearer Elections on September 16, 2025.

Professional development was further addressed on November 7, 2025, with a workshop on interview excellence led by Dr. Vandana Gambhir. The department also organised a panel discussion, "Decoding Budget 2026," on February 6, 2026, featuring experts from VIPS and NEXT IAS, in collaboration with Comspect and E-Parcus.

Department of Commerce

Comspect – The Commerce Society organized a series of academic, professional, and interactive initiatives to enhance students' understanding of commerce, finance, and contemporary business practices. The academic session began with Freshers' Orientation Programme on 4th August 2025, welcoming and introducing the incoming batch to academic and extra curricular opportunities available for them. A Seminar on E-Commerce was conducted on 6th August, featuring Mr. Kshitij Sharma from eBay. Comm Connect'25, held on 8th October, oriented the new core team of Comspect. On 22 November 2025, a Speaker Session on Careers in Consulting featured Mr. Snehil, Senior Consultant at Deloitte, who guided students on consulting practices and strategies for building successful careers in the industry. A Freshers' Party on 26 November fostered community engagement, and Reverie'26 (21st January 2026) encouraged students to reflect and set personal and professional goals.

The Department organised many more intellectually engaging events including a Panel Discussion "Decoding Budget 2026" held on 6th February 2026 and a Speaker Session on Smart Markets and Career Opportunities on 11th February 2026 by Dr. Shikha Gupta, SEBI Securities Market Trainer, addressing financial market fundamentals, certifications, and emerging technologies like AI. Through these initiatives, Comspect successfully combined academic learning, professional awareness, and active student engagement, contributing to the holistic development of commerce students and setting the stage for further events planned in March and April 2026.

Department of Computer Science:

The Department of Computer Science, under the aegis of the department society, Sanganak, initiated the 2025–26 academic session with an Orientation Program aimed at introducing first-year students to the department's technical environment and culture. To foster mentorship and community, the society organized "Freshers' 2025," which provided an interactive platform for students across different years to promote inclusiveness and encourage participation in co-curricular activities. On January 21, 2026, the society hosted a specialized group discussion titled "Fourth Year Unfiltered: A Senior Junior Group Discussion". This event facilitated peer-to-peer knowledge sharing, where final-year students provided insights on course progression, internship opportunities, placement strategies, and further education paths. These initiatives emphasized practical learning and career guidance, strengthening the department's commitment to advancing students' technical capabilities and professional readiness in the tech industry.

Department of Economics:

The Department of Economics organized a series of academic sessions and discussions aimed at enhancing students' understanding of finance, careers, and economic policy. The year began with an insightful session titled "Financial Literacy – Series 1: Managing Money the Smart Way" on 30th October 2025, featuring Mr. Kundan Prajapati, Founder of The Trading Scholar, a certified options trader and NISM Series VIII certified professional. He discussed key aspects of budgeting and early investing, emphasizing the importance of financial discipline and informed decision-making.

Continuing the initiative, a seminar titled "Cracking Off-Campus Internships and Placements" was held under the aegis of E-parcus: The Economics Society, on 28th January 2026, delivered by Mr. Aditya Goyal, Analyst at Bain & Company. The session highlighted networking, resume building, interview preparation, and the effective use of LinkedIn. Further enriching students' understanding of global economics, the webinar "Trade Challenges and Ever-Changing Rupee Dynamics" on 31st January 2026 explored India's external trade structure, import challenges, and factors affecting the rupee's value and their impact on inflation, investment, and economic growth.

The society also hosted a panel discussion, "Decoding Budget 2026: Growth with Discipline," on 6th February 2026, featuring experts from VIPS and Next IAS, analyzing the key highlights and macroeconomic implications of Union Budget 2026. Concluding the series, the webinar "Smart Money Moves: Building Financial Literacy in Your 20s" on 8th February 2026 was delivered by Ms. Neeta Negi, who has over 20 years of leadership experience at Dell and in fintech, focusing on financial literacy and encouraging students to develop financial discipline for long-term stability and independence.

Department of English

The Department of English conducted a five days Orientation program for First Year– English Honours and Program students in August 2025, introducing them to the marking scheme, grading system, and academic targets. The programme concluded with an interaction session with faculty members and society convenors. On 13th October 2025, an interdisciplinary panel discussion: “From Hamlet to Heartburn” was organised, bringing together perspectives from medicine and literature.

Cinaesthesia, the English Department Film Club, continued its engagement with cinema and screened two short films by Satyajit Ray and Neighbours by Norman McLaren, followed by a film review competition titled “From Image to Text.”, on 24th September 2025. On 11th February 2026, the club organised a mystery and thriller-themed quiz, “Whodunnit,” featuring rounds from literature and films with visual and aural clues. The event was successfully led by students, reflecting the collaborative spirit of the club.

In(k)linations, the English Department Book club, conducted book reading and discussion sessions. Furthermore, on 1st October 2025, “In(k)quizitive Minds: a Literary Quiz Competition” was organised. The event saw active student participation, fostering an environment of healthy competition and intellectual curiosity.

On 6th February 2026, Tete-a-Tete: An Interactive Orientation Session was conducted for third-year students to introduce them to their upcoming fourth-year specializations. The session outlined university guidelines for the Research, Translation, and Entrepreneurship tracks and facilitated an informal interaction between faculty and students.

Department of Environmental Studies

The Department of Environmental Studies organized significant academic events on climate and sustainability. On 10 September 2025, a lecture under the Climate and Inclusivity Lecture Series titled “National Capital and its Air Plight: Measuring a Trajectory” was delivered by Dr. Mani Singh, Jamia Millia Islamia University. On 11 February 2026, a Skill Development Workshop for undergraduate students featured an expert talk by Dr. Ludovic Dumée, Chief Scientific Officer at Element Zero, Australia, on carbon capture and scalable greenhouse gas management.

Hindi Vibhag

10 फरवरी 2026 को संस्कृत एवं हिन्दी विभाग के संयुक्त तत्वावधान में "**संस्कृत-हिन्दी साहित्य में सन्धि और समास के रोचक अनुप्रयोग**" विषय पर एक विशेष व्याख्यान आयोजित किया गया। इस अवसर पर राष्ट्रपति सम्मानित प्रो. सुधाम्न आचार्य ने विद्यार्थियों को सन्धि एवं समास के विविध प्रयोगों की गहनता तथा रोचकता से अवगत कराया। यह व्याख्यान विद्यार्थियों के लिए अत्यंत प्रेरणादायी एवं ज्ञानवर्धक सिद्ध हुआ।

इसके अतिरिक्त, 11 फरवरी 2026 को **विकसित भारत अभियान (1947-2047)** के अंतर्गत निबंध लेखन, भाषण, स्वरचित कविता वाचन तथा मोबाइल रील निर्माण प्रतियोगिताओं का आयोजन किया गया। छात्राओं ने उत्साहपूर्वक सहभागिता करते हुए अपनी रचनात्मकता, अभिव्यक्ति-कौशल तथा सामाजिक चेतना का उत्कृष्ट परिचय दिया।

24 फरवरी 2026 को "**साहित्यिक शोध में पत्र-पत्रिकाओं की भूमिका**" विषय पर एक दिवसीय संगोष्ठी का आयोजन किया गया। इसमें विद्वानों ने शोध कार्य में पत्र-पत्रिकाओं की महत्ता पर अपने विचार प्रस्तुत किए तथा विद्यार्थियों को शोध-पत्र प्रस्तुत करने का अवसर प्राप्त हुआ। विभाग के शिक्षकों ने भी राष्ट्रीय स्तर की पत्र-पत्रिकाओं में अपने शोध-आलेख प्रकाशित कर विभाग की शैक्षणिक प्रतिष्ठा को और अधिक सुदृढ़ बनाया।

विभाग ने शिक्षण एवं शोध के मध्य संतुलन स्थापित करते हुए विद्यार्थियों को बहुआयामी विकास के विविध अवसर प्रदान किए। हिन्दी विभाग का सतत प्रयास है कि आगामी वर्षों में भी साहित्यिक एवं शोधपरक गतिविधियों के माध्यम से विद्यार्थियों को नवीन दृष्टि प्रदान की जाए तथा हिन्दी भाषा एवं साहित्य के अध्ययन-अध्यापन को और अधिक सशक्त एवं समृद्ध बनाया जाए।

Department of History

The 2025-26 academic session commenced with the unanimous election of office bearers for the departmental society, Historia. To bridge the gap between classroom learning and field experience, the society organized an educational excursion to the historic by-lanes of Delhi. This included a curated heritage walk and photography session, alongside visits to the National Museum and the National Archives of India, enabling students to engage directly with architectural heritage and archival research spaces.

Creative and cultural initiatives were a cornerstone of the year, featuring "Kalakriti" (a book-making and clay modeling workshop), the "Jashn-E-Noor" musical event, and "Candid Canvas," an inter-college art and photography

competition. The department welcomed its new cohort with the "Masquerades" Fresher's Red-Carpet event and fostered intellectual exchange across the University of Delhi by hosting "Itihas ki Khoj," a prestigious inter-college competition.

Academic engagement was further strengthened through the literary competition "Time and Transformation" and the formal observation of the International Day of Non-Violence. The department also played a pivotal role in the Lakshmibai Jayanti 2025 celebrations, contributing through detailed exhibitions and documentary screenings. The session was enriched by distinguished lectures from Prof. Ajay Sinha, who spoke on the transformation of dance, and Prof. Amar Farooqui, who provided insights into the historiography of the 1857 Revolt.

Department of Home Science

The Department of Home Science and Plethora – the Home Science Society organised diverse academic and experiential initiatives during the academic session. B.A. (Programme) Food Technology students organized a Bulk Production and Exhibition-cum-Sale under the brand "NUTRIBITE" on 9th April 2025, demonstrating skills in hygienic processing, packaging, costing, marketing, and entrepreneurship. The department also celebrated Rashtriya Poshan Maah (September–October 2025) in collaboration with the Nutrition Society of India, organizing competitions, anthropometric assessments, plantation drives, and expert lectures on obesity prevention and Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF).

Skill development was further strengthened through a Hands-on Bakery Workshop (1st October 2025) and Bakery Exhibition (14th October 2025), along with academic engagements such as a workshop on "Biochemical Analysis of Molecules" at the Institute of Home Economics (15th October 2025) and a lecture on "Nucleic Acids" (29th October 2025). Additionally, 55 students received training in Food Fortification at NIFTEM on 11th November 2025, gaining exposure to industry practices.

Under Fabric and Apparel Science, students visited the National Museum and National Crafts Museum & Hastkala Academy, and participated in a Wardrobe Management Workshop, on 11th September 2025, by Ms. Priyanka Pawar and a Crochet Workshop in October 2025. Activities under Resource Management and Development Communication included an Entrepreneurship Awareness Programme, a workshop on sustainable resource utilization, and a Consumer Awareness Programme.

In Human Development, students attended sessions including Psychometric

Testing on 26th April 2025 by Dr. Arpit Yadav, a workshop on Designing Developmentally Appropriate Activities on 21st February 2025 by Dr. Deepa Kannur, a lecture on “Adulthood and Ageing” on 16th October 2025 by Dr. Krushnapriya Sahoo, and a mental health workshop conducted on 21st January 2026. An Inter-College Toy Making and Photography Competition (14 November 2025) and a career guidance session on Early Childhood Education (31 January 2026) in collaboration with Dr. B.R. Ambedkar University Delhi further enriched student engagement.

The department also celebrated academic achievements, including Ms. Binou, university topper in B.Sc. Home Science (Hons), and six students securing admission to M.Sc. Home Science programmes in the University of Delhi through CUET-PG. These accomplishments underscore the department’s commitment to academic excellence and professional readiness.

Department of Mathematics

The Department of Mathematics at Lakshmibai College strives to cultivate critical thinking and intellectual curiosity through interactive workshops and seminars that celebrate the beauty of pure mathematics. The department conducted a seminar on “General Mathematics and MCA Program Success Strategies” led by alumna Laghima Gupta, and hosted a series of engaging events featuring Dr. Madhu Gupta from FLAME University and Prof. Swarn Singh from Sri Venkateswara College.

In collaboration with CypherX, the department attended a seminar at Satyawati College by Dr. Kavita Gupta of Kirori Mal College, who was subsequently invited to Lakshmibai College to conduct an interactive session on “Mathematical Insights from Indian Knowledge Systems”. To further foster academic engagement, the department organized an inter-year quiz competition on pure mathematics, encouraging healthy competition among students. The department remains committed to providing enriching platforms that expand students' research interests and academic skills.

Department of Music

The Department of Music actively contributed to the college’s cultural life during the academic year 2025–26 through a range of performances and collaborations. The year commenced with the Orientation of Juniors and Freshers on 29th July 2025. The Music society participated in the Independence Day celebrations in college on 15th August 2025 and commemorated Mahatma Gandhi’s birth anniversary with bhajans during the Gandhi Jayanti celebration on 3rd October 2025, reflecting values of peace and harmony. The society also performed at the Diwali Mela on 15th October 2025, adding to the festive cultural atmosphere.

On 4th November 2025, the Music society achieved a significant milestone by securing Second Prize in the Cultural Council Competition at the Faculty of Arts, University of Delhi. Members also participated in the Inter-College Debate Competition on 12th November 2025 and performed on Lakshmibai Jayanti on 19th November 2025, honoring the legacy of Rani Lakshmibai.

Further engagements included a performance at a Hindu Samelan in Gurgaon on 22nd February 2026, and a special performance on 26th February during the visit of Padma Vibhushan awardee and classical dancer Sonal Mansingh. The society also performed at Ramjas College, University of Delhi, during the National Dedication Award 2026 on 27th February, showcasing their musical talent before a wider academic audience. Through these activities, the department continued to promote musical excellence, cultural awareness, and artistic expression among students.

Department of Philosophy

During the 2025–26 academic year, the Department of Philosophy at Lakshmibai College facilitated a series of high-level academic engagements designed to bridge traditional philosophical inquiry with contemporary societal challenges. The year commenced on April 2, 2025, with a celebration of World Philosophy Day in collaboration with the Indian Council of Philosophical Research (ICPR). Distinguished scholars Prof. John Robert Clammer and Prof. Anupam Jha addressed the gathering, highlighting the critical role of philosophical thinking in addressing modern global issues. This was followed by a significant two-day National Seminar on April 28–29, 2025, titled “Relevance of ‘Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam’ in the Context of Bharat’s Evolving Role as ‘Vishwa Guru’.” Sponsored by ICPR and the Maulana Abul Kalam Azad Institute of Asian Studies, the event featured prominent dignitaries including Shri Bhagat Singh Koshyari, Former Governor of Maharashtra and Goa; Shri Harish Rawat, Former Chief Minister of Uttarakhand; Prof. Raj Kumar Mittal, Vice Chancellor, Dr. B.R. Ambedkar Central University, Lucknow. The seminar explored India's emerging intellectual leadership through the lens of global familial unity.

The academic calendar continued with a focus on political ethics through a special lecture on October 29, 2025, titled “Reinventing Gandhi: Why His Ideas Still Matter.” Delivered by Prof. Manindra Thakur from JNU, the session engaged faculty and students in a dialogue on non-violence and ethical politics in modern democracies. On November 26, 2025, the department marked Constitution Day in collaboration with the Maithili-Bhojpuri Academy, hosting speakers from the University of Delhi who deliberated on the document's enduring relevance. Moving into early 2026, the department addressed linguistic philosophy on

February 27 with a seminar titled “The Philosophy of Language & Indian Languages in the National Education Policy,” again in partnership with the Maithili-Bhojpuri Academy.

Speakers including Dr. Sujeet K. Thakur, Dr. Sangita Kumari and Dr. Chandan Kumar Jha explored the intersection of linguistic diversity and the NEP framework. The year concluded on March 11, 2026, with a National Conference and Research Workshop conducted alongside the Delhi Sanskrit Academy. Titled “India’s Intellectual Tradition and Contemporary Interdisciplinary Issues,” the conference featured an inaugural session with renowned scholars such as Prof. Sachchidanand Mishra and Prof. Ranjan Tripathi. These events collectively enriched the college's intellectual environment, fostering a robust culture of interdisciplinary research and scholarly exchange.

Department of Political Science

The Department of Political Science began the 2025–26 academic year with a Students Orientation Program on 4 August 2025, introducing students to the department, faculty, and course structure. The department hosted special lectures by Prof. Satish Kumar on contemporary world politics from an Indian perspective and Prof. Biswajit Mohanty on Research Methodology. On Constitution Day, in collaboration with the Department of Philosophy, a seminar titled “The Philosophy of the Constitution and its Relevance in Contemporary Times” provided an interdisciplinary platform to reflect on India’s constitutional foundations.

The first-semester students participated in educational visits to Rashtrapati Bhavan (26 August 2025 and 17 January 2026) and the World Book Fair (17 February 2026), enhancing experiential learning and exposure to national institutions and academic scholarship. The department conducted society elections for SIYAASAT on 16 September 2025, followed by an Investiture Ceremony for the newly elected office bearers.

SIYAASAT organized numerous academic and co-curricular activities, including a Poster Making Competition on “Stopping Child Labour, Trafficking, and Exploitation,” a Rangoli Competition on socio-political themes, and an Online Reel Making Competition titled “Politics: Memes in Motion.” Additionally, a Declamation Competition “Swaraj” and a campus Treasure Hunt encouraged analytical thinking, oratory skills, teamwork, and problem-solving.

Through these initiatives, the department successfully integrated academic engagement with creative expression, fostering critical thinking, socio-political awareness, and holistic student development.

Department of Punjabi

The Punjabi Department actively organized and participated in various academic and co-curricular activities to foster creativity and intellectual growth among students. On 15 October 2025, it held four competitions: Poster Making, Poetry, Beautiful Handwriting, and Paper Reading, with enthusiastic student participation. Additionally, on 19 October 2025, the department hosted a talk titled “Punjabi Language: Current Status and Prospects,” delivered by Mr. Parkash Singh Gill, a career counsellor.

Department of Psychology

The Department of Psychology, through its society Persona, continued to foster an empathetic academic environment promoting mental health awareness, psychological literacy, research engagement, and holistic student development during the academic year 2025–2026. The year commenced with the Freshers’ Orientation on 4th August 2025, introducing students to the department, faculty, and opportunities within Persona. Emphasis on professional exposure was reflected in sessions such as “Counselling in Practice: Tools, Techniques and Insights,” “Psychopharmacology Essentials,” “Psychotherapy Decoded,” and “Psych in Practice: Understanding Minds Beyond Textbooks,” which familiarized students with counselling techniques, therapeutic skills, clinical practice, and professional ethics.

Persona also strengthened research training through the Research 101 lecture series and workshops on regression analysis, structural equation modelling using SPSS, exploratory factor analysis, and APA referencing, equipping students with essential research and data analysis skills.

Mental health awareness remained a key focus through events including “Understanding the LGBTQ+ Spectrum,” “Swastha Nari Shashakta Pariwaar,” “Dil Se Dil Tak: Body Image and Eating Disorders,” and “Access to Services: Mental Health in Catastrophes and Emergencies.” Activities during World Mental Health Day, such as “Express to De-Stress” and a Mental Health Awareness Walk, further encouraged dialogue and campus engagement.

Additional initiatives included a film discussion (“Lights, Camera, Analysis!”), Dance Movement Therapy session, Teachers’ Day celebration, Freshers’ Party 2025, and a Workshop on Persuasion Skills (March 2026). Collectively, these activities enriched students’ academic learning, professional skills, and awareness of contemporary psychological issues.

Department of Sanskrit

The Department of Sanskrit had a vibrant academic year, blending cultural traditions with academic engagement. The year began with a “Masquerade Touch” themed Fresher’s Party on 26th November, fostering bonds between new students and seniors. On 10th February, in collaboration with the Department of Hindi, a special lecture on the “Interesting Applications of Sandhi and Samasa in Sanskrit-Hindi Literature” was delivered by President-awardee Prof. Sudyumna Acharya. The Sahitya Parishad hosted an Inter-Departmental Shloka Recitation and Speech Competition on 18th February, followed by a National Seminar on 24th February exploring “The Role of Magazines and Journals in Literary Research,” where 8th-semester students presented their own research. These events, driven by faculty and student initiatives, successfully advanced the department’s mission of preserving literary heritage while promoting modern scholarship.

Department of Sociology

The Department of Sociology actively engaged students in academic, cultural, and professional initiatives during the academic year 2025–26, fostering intellectual growth, leadership, and community participation. The year began with the Departmental Elections 2025 and the Sociosphere orientation for first-year students, introducing freshers to the department, its faculty, and opportunities for engagement. The department organised a two-day National Seminar on “Elderly Care in Viksit Bharat @2047: Policies and Programmes for a Dignified Life” (September 24-25, 2025) in collaboration and sponsored by National Institute of Social Defence, that highlighted challenges faced by the elderly and facilitated a robust exchange of ideas among experts and students. Furthermore, an online lecture on “Digital Revolution, Digital Society and Rise of Digital Divide,” by Dr. Mahmudul Hasan Laskar was organised on 15th October 2025, which enhanced understanding of social policies, technology, and inequality.

The department promoted cultural and creative expression through Sociolights at the Diwali Mela, the Freshers’ Party (26th November 2025), a documentary screening of Period. End of Sentence. (28th January 2026), and the Religion and Modernity Open Mic Competition, encouraging dialogue on gender, religion, and social issues.

In its concerted effort to honour scholarship and intellectual legacy, the department organised a talk titled “Honouring Andre Béteille: The Voices of Sociology” on 6th February 2026 and hosted a guest lecture by Professor B.K. Nagla. Students also contributed to the proposed annual magazine “Nuktah”, while the Felicitation Ceremony, Farewell 2026, and “ZEN” 2026 recognized achievements, promoted well-being, and strengthened peer interaction. Finally, a research and dissertation session equipped students with guidance for their final-year projects, combining academic rigor with practical learning.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND SPORTS

The Department of Physical Education and Sports steadfastly continues its mission of nurturing talent and cultivating a vibrant culture of sporting excellence. The academic session 2025–26 has stood as a remarkable testament to determination, discipline, and the indomitable spirit of our athletes. Throughout the year, the college proudly marked its presence in a diverse range of Inter-College tournaments organized by the University of Delhi. Our spirited sportspersons competed in Archery, Athletics, Boxing, Chess, Cricket, Judo, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Netball, Softball, Shooting, Volleyball, Taekwondo, Wrestling, and Weightlifting. Expanding their horizons further, our students also participated enthusiastically in Yoga, Baseball and Beach Kabaddi.

With unwavering dedication, perseverance, and exemplary sportsmanship, our athletes rose to every challenge, transforming hard work into honours' and bringing pride and distinction to the college at the International, University, National, State, Intercollege and District levels.

3. Take care of the College property. Any damage to or loss of Laboratory equipment and/or other property of the College will lead to strict disciplinary action against the miscreant.
4. Take up all assignments, tests and examinations of the College seriously and try to perform the best. Any information and/or other task assigned to you should be submitted within the given deadline.
5. Read notices/circulars displayed on the College Notice Board/ College App/Website. Ignorance of not reading any notice/circular thus displayed shall not be accepted as an excuse for failing to comply with the directions contained in it.
6. Be responsible for your actions and learn to share and shoulder the collective responsibility of your class.
7. Use all the resources available in the college judiciously and effectively. The library, the playground, the canteen and the Common Room could be your learning and interacting hub.
8. In case of any problem or confusion, bring the matter immediately to the notice of your Class Mentor.
9. File any genuine complaint to the concerned authority without fear.
10. Use the college furniture responsibly. If you find any chair/table in the lawns, corridors and ground please put it back in the nearest classroom.
11. Indulging in any prohibited action may entail a penalty of Rs.100/-200/-300/500/1000/ and disciplinary action.

Don'ts

1. Don't do ragging and also don't be a mute witness to ragging. It is a criminal offence punishable under the Indian Penal Code. Strict disciplinary action will be taken against any student indulging in any form of ragging or Eve-Teasing inside the College premises or outside.
2. The College is your second home. Don't litter the Campus. A clean and healthy environment will lead to a better tomorrow.
3. Don't use unfair means during examinations. Misconduct during examination, production of false information or documents for admission purposes and the failure to return materials taken on loan from the College would be seriously dealt with.
4. Don't use foul language within the Campus.
5. Don't indulge in any activity that may cause harm to others or to yourself.
6. Desist from violence of any kind inside the Campus or outside it.
7. Smoking and/or consumption of any kind of alcoholic drinks/drugs inside the College is strictly prohibited.

ORDINANCE XV-B: Maintenance of discipline among Students of the University

1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice-Chancellor.
2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he / she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
 - a. Physical assault, or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and non-teaching staff of any Institution / Department and against any student within the University of Delhi
 - b. Carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapons
 - c. Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976
 - d. Violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes
 - e. Any practice-whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory of women
 - f. Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner
 - g. Willful destruction of institutional property
 - h. Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds
 - i. Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system.
 - j. Prohibition of Ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
4. Without prejudice to the generality of his / her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice Chancellor, may in the exercise of his / her powers aforesaid order or direct that any student or

students –

- a. be expelled;
- b. be, for a stated period rusticated; or

be not for a stated period, admitted to a programme or programmes of study

c. in a College, Department or Institution of the University; or

d. be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or e. be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or that the result of the student or students concerned in the Examination or Examinations in which he/she or they have appeared be cancelled.

5. Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
6. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself / herself with a copy of these rules. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he /she submits himself / herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-chancellor and several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the rules that have been framed therein by the University.

ORDINANCE XV-C: Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging

1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of College/ Department or Institution and any part of Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students; and includes individual or collective acts or practices which:
 - a. Involve physical assault or threat to use of physical force.
 - b. Violate the status, dignity and honour of women students.
 - c. Violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled caste and tribe.

d. Expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem.

e. Entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behaviour.

4. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of college, or University Hostel or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause above, the Proctor may also suo moto enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
7. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an inquiry, he/ she may advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an inquiry, his/ her decision shall be final.
9. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3(a), (b) and (c), the Vice Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
10. The Vice-chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not for a stated period, admitted to a programme of study in a college, departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
11. In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of the University of Delhi are found guilty; under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diplomas conferred by the University.
12. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
13. All Institutions within the Delhi University system shall be obligated to carry out instructions / directions issued under this Ordinance, and to give aid assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the effective implementation of the Ordinance.

Order of the Vice-Chancellor in pursuance of Ordinance XV-C: Where incident(s) of ragging are reported to the Vice-Chancellor by any authority under this Ordinance, the student(s) involved in ragging, shall be expelled for a specified term, designated in the order. Non-students involved in reports of ragging will be proceeded with under the criminal law of India; they will also be rendered ineligible for a period of five years from seeking enrolment in any of the

institutions of the University of Delhi. Students against whom necessary action is taken under this note, will be given post decisional hearing, with strict adherence to the rules of natural justice.

ORDINANCE XV-D/The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (MINISTRY OF LAW AND JUSTICE)

An Act to provide protection against sexual harassment of women at work place and for the prevention and redressal of complaints of sexual harassment and for matters connected there with incidental thereto.

WHEREAS sexual harassment results in violation of the fundamental rights of a woman to equality under articles 14 and 15 of the Constitution of India and her right to life and to live with dignity under article 21 of the Constitution and right to practice any profession or to carry on any occupation, trade or business which includes a right to a safe environment free from sexual harassment;

AND WHEREAS the protection against sexual harassment and the right to work with dignity are universally recognized human rights by international conventions and instruments such as Convention on the Elimination of all forms of discrimination against Women, which has been ratified on the 25th June, 1993 by the Government of India.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make provisions for giving effect to the said Convention for protection of women against sexual harassment at workplace. For details, please see the website mentioned below.

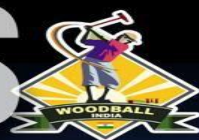
